# Lexington County Employment Up, Gross Domestic Product (GDP) Expands New Manufacturing Facility Announced

Despite warnings of an economic slowdown, Lexington County continues to build on a 10-year period of economic expansion with growth both in employment and GDP. Over the past year County employment grew by 2.6% or 3,681 jobs led by manufacturing and health care. Three-year employment growth was 3.7% exceeding that of the region. GDP expanded by 4.1% from 2017 to 2018, led by mining, professional services, health care, management of companies and construction, by percent change.

Recently, County officials, along with State and local economic development leaders, attended the USC's Darla Moore School of Business, Economic Outlook Conference. Experts warned a slowdown in economic growth may occur in 2020. To a great extent, this opinion is based on the national Purchasing Managers Index (PMI). The Index contracted for the 4<sup>th</sup> straight month in November. The November PMI was 48.1. Other factors that may impact the economy include tariffs and the impact of the tax stimulus package wearing off. Experts also agreed South Carolina and the Columbia metropolitan region are expected to remain resilient.

### **PROJECT ANNOUNCEMENT**

Kardex Remstar, a Swiss manufacturing company specializing in materials handling & automated storage solutions announced it will build a new 180,000 sq. ft. facility in the Lexington County Industrial Park. The project represents an \$18 million investment and will create at least 40 jobs.

# **Economic Development Briefs**

Not seasonally adjusted County employment in November was 146,572, up 3,681, or 2.6% from one year ago. Lexington County's 3-year employment growth was 3.7%, which outpaced the MSA's 2.5% growth in employment. November's unemployment rate was 1.7%, an historic low. See charts.

Comparing the most current available industry data, the top growth sectors in the County from the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter 2018 to the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter 2019 were: manufacturing; health care; information; retail; and education. See chart.

Gross taxable monthly sales for the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter were \$3.53 billion, down from \$3.63 from the same period last year. Net taxable sales in the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter 2019 were \$1.25 billion, year-to-date net taxable sales were \$3.65 billion or 74.8% of last year's sales. See charts.

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics released Gross Domestic Product (GDP) data for counties in December. Lexington County's GDP for 2018 was \$12.3 billion an increase of 4.1% from 2017.

## **Percent Change in GDP**


Top industry growth sectors 2017-18 based on change in GDP value


